Thank you for your request received on 1 August 2019, for the following information:

I am writing with a request about cyber security under the Freedom of Information Act 2000.

Could you please tell me how many incidents of cyber-attacks you have recorded since the beginning of 2017?

Of these can you tell me how many incidents were referred to external sources including the police, the National Crime Agency and the National Cyber Security Centre?

And how many of these incidents were handled internally? Please let me know if you require any further information about this request.

We have processed this request under the Freedom of Information Act 2000.

### Response

I can confirm that London Borough of Barnet holds the information you requested.

However, we consider that the following exemptions apply to some of the information requested. The remaining information is not withheld and is below.

I am writing with a request about cyber security under the Freedom of Information Act 2000.

Could you please tell me how many incidents of cyber-attacks you have recorded since the beginning of 2017?

None.

Of these can you tell me how many incidents were referred to external sources including the police, the National Crime Agency and the National Cyber Security Centre?

And how many of these incidents were hand led internally?

None.

Please let me know if you require any further information about this request.

Please let me know if you require any further information about this request. CHECK is the umbrella term for the National Cyber Security Centre approved penetration test companies and the method in which they conduct a penetration test. Could you please tell me whether you have had a CHECK test in i) 2016/17, ii) 2017/18 and iii) 2018/19?

Yes every year.

Could you also tell me what cyber security do you have aside from CHECK work including the following

- i) user education
- ii) other penetration tests
- iii) internal security team -
- iv) other.

We consider that the qualified exemption set out in Section 31 (Law enforcement) subsection (3) applies to the information requested in reference to 31(1)(a) the prevention and Detection of Crime. Therefore, we have decided to withhold the information.

In applying this exemption, we have had to balance the public interest in withholding the information against the interest in favour of disclosure.

#### **Refusal Notice**

This information is exempt from disclosure under Section 31(3) of the Freedom of Information Act 2000. Section 31 of the FOIA relates to Law Enforcement, and Section 31(3) removes the public authority's duty to confirm or deny whether information is held if to do so would, or would be likely to prejudice law enforcement.

It is the council's view that the confirmation or denial of the possession of information relating to the council's cyber resilience, would be likely to compromise the council's information security strategies by giving cyber criminals insight into vulnerabilities which may, or may not, exist.

Section 31(3) is a qualified exemption, as such we have gone on to perform a public interest test in order to assess the public interest arguments for and against declaring whether or not the equested information is held.

#### For Disclosure:

 Confirmation of possession would demonstrate a commitment to transparency with regard to the council's undertakings, and could provide assurance that the council have robust IT infrastructure in place

# **Against Disclosure:**

- Maintaining the integrity and security of the council's systems
- Preventing cyber-attacks and similar against the council systems.
- Revealing whether or not the information requested is held or applicable to

London Borough of Barnet would be likely to offer cyber criminals insight into not only the strengths of the council's cyber security, but also any potential weaknesses that may exist. This could ultimately result in a future cyberattack.

One of the reasons that cyber security measures are in place is to protect the integrity of personal and sensitive personal information.

It is clear to see how the occurrence of a future cyber-attack would prejudice
the council's legal duty to safeguard personal information from loss, theft,
inappropriate access or destruction, which is why Section 31 has been
employed in this case.

On balance the public interest in maintaining the exemption outweighs that in confirming or denying whether information is held and therefore the council neither confirms nor denies whether this information is held.

In all the circumstances of the case, the public interest in maintaining the exemption outweighs the public interest in disclosing the information.
